Note: 2025 Membership dues are still \$30, please remit dues to continue receiving this newsletter.



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

RESTORATION UPDATE



Pietenpol





The engine on the once-airworthy Pietenpol was able to be started and ran beautifully. The engine and mount were extracted from that Pietenpol and installed on our Pietenpol. Both fit perfectly since they were built from the same plans. All linkages, i.e. throttle and carb heat, ignition switch wiring, and primer lines were connected. We will need to install the tachometer cable later since that is on back order and is not expected to arrive until May.

The existing cowl was a perfect fit, although not the same color, and only a slight modification was made to give access to the oil tank dipstick without removing the cowl. A slight modification to the aileron cables is in progress which will make it easier to maintain.

The existing tailwheel assembly was rather heavy at 10 lbs. so another similar tailwheel assembly made of fiberglass was ordered and will be installed in the next couple of weeks.

This will assist in decreasing the tail weight and bringing the CG location into required limits. In the next couple of weeks, the Pietenpol will be moved out of the museum and a trial run with the newly installed engine will take place to ensure all engine instruments are functioning normally. Check back with us in next quarter's newsletter to find out the status of getting this vintage bird in the air.


Our Bell 222 N990AA served for many years as an air ambulance before being stripped of its instruments, engine, transmission and propellers, hence the tractor propulsion.

They undertake various exotic missions, many involving <u>espionage</u>, with a <u>Cold War</u> theme. It was created by <u>Donald P. Bellisario</u> and was produced over four seasons, running from January 22, 1984, until August 7, 1987
