# Our Own Formidable Fokker DR-1

The Fokker DR1, although slower than many aircraft by the end of World War I, remained the most maneuverable and deadly. This is what drove fear into the Allied World War I pilots who might have crossed paths with the all-red triplane while performing their aerial duties. Because of the incredible history and success of this aircraft, the decision to complete the restoration of The Red Baron's Fokker DR1 replica at the Illinois Aviation Museum was an easy choice.

Illinois Aviation Museum obtained our latest artifact from the Tennessee Museum of Aviation in Sevierville, Tennessee. The construction of the Fokker DR1 began as a static-display aircraft but could not be finished by the first builder.

Reconstruction work commenced on the DR1 during the fall of 2021. After several members of our board of directors made the trip to Tennessee to place it on a flat-bed trailer and haul it back, it came to its new home. As the pictures indicate, the restoration included a complete cockpit make-over with replica instruments, belts, and harnesses. New replica guns were built. Much of the heavier wood used in the initial construction was replaced with aluminum. All the original fabric was stripped and was replaced with very light 104 uncertified aircraft fabric. The originally constructed wings could not be used, so new wings were built, including new lightweight aluminum ailerons. The wings were constructed much like the original DR1 wings, with box spars, wood ribs, and rib lacing. Aluminum replaced the original mahogany leading edges.

Our volunteer restoration team, led by Dan Christine, completed this replica in July. The Fokker DR-1 will provide a step back in time when the skies turned deadly during World War I.

## BILL ANDERSON DIRECTOR OF FACILITIES AND SECRETARY



How long have you been a part of IAM, and how did you get involved?

Since it was 6 months old. I joined Father's day weekend of 2004. My son and his family went to Charlie's Restaurant for breakfast. My son called me and said there was a Navy jet on the ground. I replied, there is no way, so I had to come out and see for myself. It turned out to be the T-2, and Kent Demuth had a table set up looking for people to join, so I filled out the form and became a museum member.

#### What are you responsible for at the museum?

I answer emails, set up and give tours, make sure the building is in shape, and keep track of where things are in our storage trailer. It is a lot of behind-the-scenes work.

#### Why do you like volunteering at IAM?

I have been an aviation fanatic all of my life. When I was a 13yrs old, I started to ride my bike to O'Hare airport to watch the airplanes land.

### Do you have any favorite memories at the museum?

When we presented the T-2 for the first time, that was really cool. You can watch the video here.

## What is your favorite aircraft, and why?

I have a couple. From WWII, they are the Vought F4U Corsair and the B17 Bomber. Modern aircraft would be the F2, F4B Phantom, and the F14 Tomcat. The F14 is the neatest airplane in the world, I love all Cats because I am a Navy guy, and I like Grumman aircraft in general. I am on the volunteer crew of the Aluminum Overcast, which is a touring B-17. The B-17 will fly to the midwest and give rides. I am ground security, and I also sit in the cockpit to explain the roles of the crew members.
